What were the greatest challenges faced in 2014-2015?

There are more students presenting challenges due to mental health issues. We were challenged to identify all students' areas of need and implement a plan to help them achieve success.

The increase in the awareness of mental health has also increased the number of students coming forward in need. We started working with our community supports and are encouraging our families to access community services. Our community services have created great partnerships with our school board and we will be accessing these at the school level.
